Match Starting Time And Range Rules

Access to the Cowboy Action Shooting Range will be available only after A Place To Shoot opens at 9:00 AM.

Please do not attempt to enter the range parking lot via the dirt bypass road.

Please enter the CAS range through the side gates by the pistol range or around the right side of the building,

Matches start at 9:45 AM.

Registration will close by 9:30, With the shooter' Safety Meeting to follow.

Please, present no bills larger than \$20 at registration.

Guest shooters must read and sign a liability waiver before the match.

The gate to the CAS range should be closed during a Match. Be aware that visitors may come on to the CAS range who are not familiar with CAS safety protocols.

Members having concerns or complaints about range issues shall communicate those issues to the Pistolaros club officers.

South Texas Pistolaros Guest Shooter Policy

Visiting shooters unknown to club members but possessing a valid SASS Membership who wish to register as a competitor will be a assigned a Pistolaros Officer or member as a "shooting buddy" for at least one stage. New-to-CAS individuals or guest without a valid SASS membership but with a **documented** knowledge of safe firearms hand skills (LTC, NRA certification, etc.) who desire to participate in a club match will be referred to the Range Master, or other designated Officer, for on-site orientation. If time permits, the orientation will be held before the match. If the Range Master and Match Director concur, the individuals will be assigned a mentor and permitted to register as a competitor.

Any person who have not completed any type of formal firearms training but wish to participate in CAS will be referred to a formal CAS orientation session to be provided by the club. The orientation session will use a classroom setting to address basic firearms safety, handling CAS firearms safely, **SASS** match protocols, and range and club safety rules. Upon successful completion of the classroom session, attendees will have the opportunity to shoot in a controlled setting on the CAS range. Cost per students has yet to be determined, but a range fee of \$11.00 per person plus the cost of suitable ammunition is to be expected.

Guest Shooter Liability Waiver Policy

<u>Any</u> contestant at a match who is not currently a member of the South Texas Pistolaros must first read and sign a liability waiver before competing.

NOTES FROM THE RANGE MASTER - DOWN RANGE

September's shoot was quick and fun. Thank you so much for the help on set up and the way everyone pitched in during the match. I did get talked to by a few people about Stage 5 and on hindsight (and some coaching from

Sherrif Robert Love) I will tweak the design to remove the potential P-trap.

We had fourteen shooters at the match; seven of which shot sub 200 seconds. #7 made sub 200 by just 0.19 seconds. This means they all averaged less than 1.85 seconds a shot. Picosa Kid took top spot with a 129.17. Stripping out "M and P's," PK averaged 0.96 seconds a shot. Shooting Iron Miller came in second with a 134.07, averaging 1.10 seconds per shot. Beauregard Beard was only 0.70 seconds behind her, but unfortunately had a malfunction so cannot get a true shot average. We had three clean shooters: Canyon Jim (was great to have him back shooting), Latigo Lee, and Sheriff Robert Love who shot his clean match averaging 1.35 seconds a shot - fast and accurate.

October is the match I set up for Josey Wales so you want to find your inner Josey bring your extra pistols. For those new to JW - you shoot a second set of pistols in lieu of rifle and can shoot a 5th pistol or reload one pistol in lieu of shotgun, but you will still be shooting at rifle distances. Bring your second set of pistols in a bag, please do not wear all your pistols on your leather. .22's are perfectly fine for JW pistols. BTW - brass pickers love JW shooters!

To second Beans - we really need your <u>COMMITTED</u> help for the HAVA shoot. As of right now, we do not have enough people to run the full set up so I will have to drastically reduce the plan. I cannot write a plan for "well' I think I can...or we will see." You do not have to be there all day; afternoon is fine - just let Beans know when you can, and I will work around that

The long-range forecast has a projected high of 91, but the better news is the low of 68 degrees the night before!

'Nough said...brass is up, targets are up, shooter up! BEEP...click, click click...ummmm Cowboy, did you forget to load your guns?





John Bet-a-Million Gates

If you find yourself near San Antonio's City Hall, you might just see a small Historical Marker commemorating one of the more important events in Texas history that few recall.

In the years after the Civil War, several noteworthy individuals, such as Charles Goodnight and Oliver Loving, developed a profitable way to supply Kansas City slaughterhouses with Texas beef. At the time, there were some six million cattle wandering freely across several hundred million acres of Texas. There were also ranches hoping to profit from the beef trade. With West Texas being almost devoid of trees, fence-building was simply not an option. Keeping one's own herd separate from the "Maverick" cattle occupying the open land was a huge problem.

Enter one twenty-two-year-old recent college graduate by the name of John Gates. He came to San Antonio to convince local ranchers that he had a solution to the problem of free-running stock. The product he showcased was stranded wire with pointed "spurs" spaced along the length of it. Gates said it was "stronger than whiskey and cheaper than dirt." Many of the cattlemen, accustomed to the ways of wild cattle, openly scoffed at him.

Gates convinced city officials to allow a demonstration on Military Plaza. Gates constructed a "wire corral" and invited cattlemen to bring some Longhorns into the enclosure. Reports indicated that more than a few bets were made on how long it would take for the cattle to simply plow their way through the "barbed wire." To their chagrin, the cattle approached the wire…and stopped. There were no escapees from the enclosure.

Gates sold a railroad boxcar full of the "wire fence" the evening following the Military Plaza demonstration. He took orders for more...a lot more. In one year, over three million pounds of wire was sold in Texas alone. The cattle business, and the history of Texas, changed forever. Open Rangelands simply ceased to exist. Landowners were able to fence-in their herds and their water supplies. Long cattle drives to Kansas City were soon replaced by railroad cars full of cattle. Soon, the Longhorns were replaced by fine beef cattle kept behind the wire.

Not everyone thought barbed wire was a good idea. Cattle drovers accustomed to driving their herds to water or grazing might find their way blocked by a rancher using wire fencing. History records more than one nasty fight when ranchers found their wire cut and their resources plundered. Expensive imported fine beef cattle could have their genetics altered by encounters with rangy Longhorns. Cowboys found to have wire cutters in their saddlebags were treated like cattle thieves, sometimes with fatal consequences.

All the while, John Gates became a millionaire. Years later, he would repeat his success when oil was discovered in Texas in 1901. He rode the oil boom to yet another fortune.

If you are a returning volunteer, you only need to let Beans know and update any contact information if that has changed since last year.
